Free installations may include weather stripping, attic insulation, heating systems, water heaters, showerheads, lighting, and more.



SWITCH TO AN ELECTRIC HEAT PUMP WATER HEATER

Replacing your gas water heater with a heat pump is better for your health, your wallet, and the environment. Make the switch to an efficient electric heat pump water heater with these options:

- **Full Service Solution**—As low as \$2,300 for a standard installation through a City contractor, which includes a rebate, or as low as \$1,100 for a standard installation with \$20 monthly payments for 5 years.
- Emergency Water Heater Solution—Have a water heater emergency? Switch quickly to a new heat pump water heater within two days using the City's emergency program. Weekend service at an extra charge.

HOME ELECTRIFICATION REBATES

The City of Palo Alto Utilities (CPAU) has new Home Electrification Rebates to help residents replace gas appliances with clean, efficient electric appliances. In addition to the main rebates listed below, add-on rebates are available for electrical panel upgrades, wiring and circuit splitting technology, and attic insulation.

- Heat Pump Water Heater Rebate Receive a rebate of \$3,500 by replacing a gas water heater with a heat pump water heater.
- Heat Pump HVAC Receive a rebate of \$2,500 by replacing a fossil fuel-based heating source, such as a gas furnace, with a heat pump HVAC system.
- **Gas Meter Removal Incentive** Receive an incentive of \$2,500 for fully electrifying your home, with confirmation of gas meter removal.

How it Works:

- **1.** Start a rebate application to reserve funds.
- Once approved, funds are reserved for up to 120 days as you install your equipment.
- **3.** Complete installation and pass final inspection.
- 4. Submit your final documentation.
- **5.** Receive your rebate check in the mail within 5 weeks.

ROOFTOP SOLAR

The City of Palo Alto has supported adoption of residential rooftop solar since 1999. Over 1,000 residential rooftop systems are installed in Palo Alto and City of Palo Alto Utilities (CPAU) has resources to guide new customers through the process of going solar.

Since 2015, Palo Alto has participated in a solar group-buy program known as Bay Area **SunShares**. The program offers vetted contractors and discounted prices on rooftop solar, and typically runs from September through November. SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOLS

The Safe Routes to School Program is a local community partnership between the City of Palo Alto, Palo Alto Unified School District (PAUSD), and the Parent Teacher Association. The program's mission is to reduce risk to students en route to and from school and encourage families to choose healthy, active, sustainable alternatives to driving solo more often. Program participation has continued to grow, with an impressive 58% of PAUSD students currently walking or biking to school. Every year, the City of Palo Alto Safe Routes to School program provides in-class bicycle and pedestrian safety education to students in K, 1, 2, 3, 5 and 6th grade, in addition to offering middle and high school Back to School Bike Safety/Bike Repair events.

YARD & LANDSCAPING

LANDSCAPE EFFICIENCY PROGRAMS

The City of Palo Alto Utilities (CPAU) partners with Valley Water to offer programs and rebates to help Palo Alto residents use water more efficiently outdoors. The programs below require application approval before purchasing equipment or starting any work.

Free Water Wise Outdoor Survey—Home irrigation systems are often inefficient due to equipment placement/coverage, over-watering, misting and evaporation patterns, and outdated equipment. Schedule a free Water Wise Outdoor Survey to consult an irrigation specialist on ways to improve your system. Sites must have at least one valve-operated irrigation zone.

Landscape Conversion Rebate — Convert your lawn and/or swimming pool to a sustainable, low-water-use landscape and get a rebate of up to \$4 per sq. ft. Consider a rain garden as part of your design. See Stormwater Rebates Program (page 15) to learn more. *Artificial turf is not eligible for the rebate.*

Irrigation Equipment Upgrade Rebate—Upgrade to a smart highefficiency irrigation system.

Graywater Laundry-to-Landscape Rebate — Direct rinse water from your clothes washer to your landscape with a graywater laundry to landscape system and get a rebate of up to \$400.

STORMWATER REBATES PROGRAM

Rebates are available to help reduce the cost of stormwater runoff upgrades. Use them towards making a drought-tolerant landscape.

Rain Barrels—Collect and store rainfall from your roof through downspouts for use in landscape irrigation. Rain barrels are an inexpensive and effective way to reduce water consumption and stormwater runoff.

Cisterns—Collect and hold significantly more water than a rain barrel. Cisterns can be above-ground or below-ground tanks and can hold enough water to irrigate larger landscapes or water-intensive gardens.

Pervious Pavement—Allow rainfall to infiltrate into underlying soils. Pervious pavements are often made of materials such as porous asphalt, pervious concrete, and permeable interlocking pavers.

Rain Gardens—Collect rainwater diverted from a roof into a garden. Rain gardens keep runoff from reaching the storm drain system and provide habitat for birds, butterflies, and other animals, especially when planted with native plants. Rain gardens are a great addition when converting your lawn to a low-water use landscape. See Landscape Conversion Rebate (page 14) for more information.

POOL DRAINING

Pools contain chlorine and other chemicals. If they are drained into the gutter or storm drain, the chemicals will end up in our creeks harming organisms and wildlife. If draining your pool is necessary, discharge the water to a sanitary sewer cleanout so it can receive proper treatment. The sewer line clean-out is usually located in the front landscaped area or near the sidewalk and marked with an "S." It looks like a small pipe with a black or white cap. If you need help locating your cleanout, call a plumber or contact the **City of Palo Alto Utilities** for more information.

If your pool is larger than 20,000 gallons or needs to be drained to a City manhole, please reach out to Pretreatment@paloalto.gov for an Exceptional Waste Discharge Permit prior to draining.

TREE ORDINANCE

The City of Palo Alto recently updated its Tree Protection Ordinance, which went into effect July 21, 2022. The goals of the Tree Ordinance Update are to increase native, drought-tolerant species, ensure community welfare, strive for no net loss/increase in canopy cover, and minimize negative impacts on the urban forest from development.

The updated ordinance better protects a larger part of Palo Alto's urban forest and includes several new measures such as:

- Strengthened procedures for when protected tree removals are proposed.
- An expanded definition of protected trees to incorporate four additional protected native species, and all trees (except high water users) with a diameter of 15 inches or greater.
- **Maintenance requirements** for property owners who have a protected tree on their property.
- Increased staffing and resources to implement these new policies and procedures.

REDUCING PESTICIDES

Residential pesticide use by homeowners and pest control services is the main source of pesticide pollution in San Francisco Bay. Pesticides wash into storm drains and creeks when it rains or when you water your garden. Integrated Pest Management (IPM) offers effective techniques and less toxic products for controlling common pests.

Some IPM techniques include:

- **Sheet mulching**—Sheet mulching is an easy, natural method of getting rid of grass and weeds by layering mulch over cardboard to block sunlight. It is an inexpensive, eco-friendly method to replace lawn with drought-tolerant or native landscaping.
- **Thoughtful landscape design**—Certain landscape designs can outcompete weeds so that pesticide use is not necessary.
- Using less-toxic products—Most local hardware stores and nurseries carry less toxic product options. You can find a list of these products, as well as local stores that carry them, at mywatershedwatch.org.
- **Hiring an expert**—When hiring a professional pest control service, consider hiring an Ecowise, Green Pro, or Green Shield Certified pest control company that can employ a variety of techniques to control pests while minimizing the use of pesticides.
